BIOGRAPHY

Bishop Karowei Dorgu's life was a tapestry woven with threads of resilience, faith, true love and a commitment to his calling. Born to George Kpunakpu Dorgu and Mrs Matilda Elizabeth Dorgu (née Torru) a Diocesan Lay Reader of Benin Diocese and an evangelist respectively, as the second twin to his sister Karara Collette Dorgu, and the 11th of 12 children, on 27th June 1958, in Burutu, present day Bayelsa State, Nigeria.

In 1987, Karowei took a significant step in his personal life, when on 15th August he married his beloved wife, Mosun, a union that would become a pillar of strength and love throughout his life journey. Their love story began in Medical School, and it was one that would endure through the ages.

Karowei and Mosun welcomed two precious sons into their lives. Their first son, Timi, was born in May 1988 in Zaria, where the parents were working in a missionary hospital, providing care to those in need. In February 1996, their second son, Joshua, was born in North London. Joshua brought immense joy and laughter to their home, filling it with the exuberance of youth and the promise of a bright future.

Tragically, on 20th January 2015, Joshua passed away just before his 19th birthday. In his memory, the Joshua Dorgu Foundation was established. The foundation has this year placed its first scholarship student at Highgate School, where Josh was a pupil. It stands as a symbol of hope and a source of support for those who aspire to learn and grow, just as Joshua did during his all-too-brief time with us.

As a loving husband and father, Karowei's family was at the centre of his world. He shared his love for faith, knowledge, and compassion with them, creating a home filled with warmth and purpose.

From his early days, Karowei showed a remarkable dedication to knowledge. Between 1979 and 1985, he pursued his medical studies at the College of Medicine, University of Lagos, earning Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery degrees. As a general practitioner, he touched countless lives, bringing healing and hope to those in need. Driven by a steadfast calling to serve, Karowei enrolled at Oak Hill College, a conservative Evangelical theological institution. Two years later, in 1995, he was ordained as a deacon at St Paul's Cathedral, London, by the then Bishop of London, David Hope. The following year, he ascended to the priesthood, solidifying his commitment to his spiritual mission.

From 1995 to 1998, Karowei served as a curate at St Mark's Church, Tollington Park, Islington, making an indelible mark on his parishioners. His dedication and compassion shone brightly during these formative years, prefiguring the extraordinary journey ahead.


In 1998, he embraced joining St John the Evangelist Church, Upper Holloway. During his tenure at St John's, he progressed from an assistant curate and associate vicar to a dedicated team vicar from 2000 to 2012. In 2012, he became the Vicar, or incumbent, of the church loved. On 6th March 2016, Karowei was appointed a Prebendary of St Paul's Cathedral. This role was a testament to his profound faith and dedication to his spiritual calling.

On 20th December 2016, he was announced as the next Bishop of Woolwich, within the Diocese of Southwark. The consecration ceremony on 17th March 2017 at Southwark Cathedral, led by Archbishop Justin Welby, was a defining moment not just for Karowei but for the entire Church of England. His consecration marked a historic milestone, making him the first Nigerian Bishop in the Church of England.

Karowei Dorgu was a beacon of light and a symbol of hope; and his life was a testament to the transformative power of faith, perseverance and dedication. Karowei championed justice and inclusivity, striving to make the Church truly representative of God's diverse Kingdom.

In his personal life, Karowei was a loving husband of 36 years to Mosun and a devoted father to Timi. In later years, Timi found true love and happiness, welcoming Suzie into their lives as a beloved daughter-inlove.

Bishop Karowei Dorgu departed this world on 8th September 2023, after a valiant struggle with his health. His legacy lives on in the hearts of those who loved him, we celebrate the extraordinary life he lived and the lives he touched. Bishop Karowei is also survived by five siblings; Mrs Zumo Adugbo, Chief Tamaraseri Dorgu, Mrs Stella Oganwu, twin sister Miss Karara Collette Dorgu and Mr Nana Dorgu. In Bishop Karowei Dorgu, we found a spiritual guide, a compassionate healer, and a visionary leader. His memory will forever be etched in our hearts, reminding us to embrace faith, diversity and justice as he did. As we bid farewell to this remarkable soul, let us carry forward his torch of compassion and hope, for he has left an indelible mark on our lives and on the Church.

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SOUTHWARK • CATHEDRAL •

Welcome to Southwark Cathedral. Set on the south bank of the River Thames in one of the most vibrant and diverse communities in London, this building has been a constant witness in a place of change.

The first church was built on this site around the year 606. First a convent, then a monastery, it became in 1106 the Augustinian Priory of St Mary Overie. With Westminster Abbey and St Bartholomew the Great in Smithfield it is one of the three remaining great monastic churches of London. At the Reformation the Priory became a parish church and it remains so for the people of Bankside. In 1905, as south London was rapidly expanding, the church was consecrated as the cathedral for the new Diocese of Southwark.

As well as a place of constant witness to our faith in Jesus Christ, this church has a momentous and proud history and has had links with many famous and influential characters including St Thomas Becket, Geoffrey Chaucer, William Shakespeare and Charles Dickens.

In the 20th century this cathedral was at the heart of the new movement in theology termed 'South Bank Religion'. This movement asked challenging questions of people about faith in the modern age which continue to be explored at Southwark Cathedral which describes itself as 'inclusive: faithful: radical'.

Whatever has brought you here today, you are most welcome. Become part of the life here if you can; it will change your life as you encounter with us our living God.

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
