The Community of the Cross of Nails

At the recommendation of the Unity Group, the Chapter of Southwark Cathedral has decided that the Cathedral should join the Community of the Cross of Nails (the CCN).

The CCN is a world-wide inter-denominational network of churches and other Christian organisations who share a network of common commitment to work and pray for peace, justice and reconciliation by healing the wounds of history, learning to live with difference, celebrating diversity, and by building a culture of peace. It has its roots in the post-war re-building and re-birth of Coventry Cathedral and takes as its inspiration the words of Jesus on the cross "Father forgive".

The Bishop of Southwark, Christopher Chessun, has generously contributed to the purchase of the Cross of Nails for the Cathedral so that this can be a significant and permanent addition to the Chapel designated to St Francis of Assisi and St Elisabeth of Hungary. This chapel will have a new designation for reconciliation in our own communities here in South London. This will be the focus for the Cathedral's membership of CCN, with a particular emphasis on the problems of youth violence and knife crime.

CCN partners engage with the challenges faced by many communities where a just and inclusive society is crucial for stability and peace. The Cathedral has for many years enjoyed a rich and engaging link with the Cathedral in Bergen, Norway. We are therefore delighted that Bergen has also decided to join the CCN, and to do so at the same time as Southwark. We see our membership as an extension of our ecumenical work, and having Bergen as a CCN member as well as a friend will, we are sure, give added poignancy to that relationship.

Southwark's Cross of Nails will be blessed at our 11.00am Eucharist. The Dean of Coventry, The Very Reverend John Witcombe will preach and the Bishop of Southwark will preside. We are joined at the service by friends from Southwark's link Cathedral in Rouen, representatives of other CCN partners and other guests. After the 9.00am service and before the 11.00am Eucharist, a presentation on the CCN will be given by John Witcombe. All are warmly invited to attend that presentation.

General Notices

Wardens' Update on Chapter Meetings

Chapter met for the first time in 2020 on Wednesday 15 January. The meeting continued to address many of the priorities, which have been discussed throughout 2019.

Aspects of the Cathedral's Masterplan are tabled at each Chapter meeting, to ensure the plan remains achievable and to review progress. In January engagement with local communities was reviewed, for example our relationship with Harper Road Mosque. Last year a self-evaluation exercise was carried out to assess how we could improve governance, risk management, managing our finances, delivery of our mission and our place in the community and diocese. These changes and improvements will continued to be monitored.

Chapter is kept up to date about the budget at each meeting. The new contactless payment machines were introduced at the beginning of December. £1,231 was raised between 8th December and 12th January.

Responding to the Cathedrals Working Group Measure remains a priority and we are working on how Chapter, the clergy and our staff will need to adapt to take account of the changes.

The Access Audit Report, carried out in the Summer, by David Bonnett Associates has been discussed by the Cathedral's Access Group, Chapter and FAC. It is a very thorough audit as government expectations of public places have changed. This audit is the next step to secure funding for the accessibility priorities as identified by the Access Group.

Kate Singleton, the Safeguarding officer for the Diocese, addressed Chapter on issues concerning the forthcoming Safeguarding Audit, which will be carried out at the end of February.

Many of the key issues addressed by Chapter are included in the weekly newsletter but if you would like to know more, please speak to your Cathedral Wardens, Linda and Daniel or the lay members of Chapter, Helen Quintrell or Amanda Hill.

Parking is always likely to be a challenge but Borough Market has been open on Sundays throughout December and we know this has added to the problem particularly as double yellow lines were also introduced in streets close to the Cathedral.

The difficulties are appreciated and we are hopeful that some solution can be found especially for the times when the market is open on Sundays.

The needs of our young people and those who are particularly vulnerable amongst us are most important, but each of us has a right to be in a safe church. Recent TV documentaries have highlighted what can go wrong when the church fails to address issues of abuse. At Southwark we seek to create a safe cathedral where everyone is valued and listened to. 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Welcome to Southwark Cathedral. Set on the south bank of the River Thames in one of the most vibrant and diverse communities in London, this building has been a constant witness in a place of change.

The first church was built on this site around the year 606. First a convent, then a monastery, it became in 1106 the Augustinian Priory of St Mary Overie. With Westminster Abbey and St Bartholomew the Great in Smithfield it is one of the three remaining great monastic churches of London. At the Reformation the Priory became a parish church and it remains so for the people of Bankside. In 1905, as south London was rapidly expanding, the church was consecrated as the cathedral for the new Diocese of Southwark.

As well as a place of constant witness to our faith in Jesus Christ, this church has a momentous and proud history and has had links with many famous and influential characters including St Thomas Becket, Geoffrey Chaucer, William Shakespeare and Charles Dickens.

In the 20th century this cathedral was at the heart of the new movement in theology termed 'South Bank Religion'. This movement asked challenging questions of people about faith in the modern age which continue to be explored at Southwark Cathedral which describes itself as 'inclusive: faithful: radical'.

Whatever has brought you here today, you are most welcome. Become part of the life here if you can; it will change your life as you encounter with us our living God.
