

The Friends' trip to Dresden will take place in April. We will fly to Berlin on Thursday
18 April at the very sociable time of
11am. From Berlin we will take the train to Dresden. Our hotel will be centrally located and on arrival we will settle in and have supper together. Over the next few days our programme will include a guided tour of the Frauenkirche with Eucharist on Sunday evening.
We return on Monday 22 April leaving Berlin at 15.00. The cost is £825 with a £50 additional cost for a single room.

This will include return flights (with British Airways from Heathrow) and train tickets, bed-and-breakfast accommodation with ensuite facilities, supper on the first evening and guided tours.

This is a great night of fun at the cathedral. Pop the date in your diary and begin to gather your team or even teams.

'For Weddings, Baptisms and Funerals,' an illustrated talk with John Vigar

Saturday 12 October
This lecture follows John's popular
presentation last year, `Murder, Sex
and Mayhem in English Churches,'
in which he told the story of human
tragedy and frailty as depicted in our
parish churches.

In `For Weddings, Baptisms and Funerals' John will show how pictures and objects in our churches introduce us to historic practices – many of which have been forgotten or superseded – surrounding the so-called `rites of passage`.

Our first rite of passage, baptism, is discovered via holy wells, fonts with their covers, canopies and chrismatories. The second rite of passage, holy matrimony, is inextricably linked to church porches, mazes and church ales.

The final rite of passage, the funeral, is discussed though wall paintings of a sexton's implements, huts to protect eighteenth century parsons at the

graveside and depictions of the last rites. The lecture uses illustrations including carvings, wall paintings, stained glass and objects to show a thousand years of depictions of the milestones in our human journey.

Friends' grants to the cathedral

The Trustees of the Friends have been looking at the various requests for funding from the cathedral. We have made grants for a variety of projects to help the cathedral.

Volunteer management system

Last year over 11,000 hours of volunteer time were recorded; 57 new volunteers started in various roles, new roles were introduced, there were various volunteer trips and training sessions and the monthly e-newsletters. With the number of volunteers growing, we are so fortunate and pleased to have the Friends support to launch a brandnew volunteer management system called Assemble. This will revolutionise the way that we keep data, ensuring that everything is kept together in one, secure system. This program will also enable me to easily create and promote new roles on our website and via social media, log volunteer hours, organise rotas, process travel expenses and provide regular news items that

can be shared with all volunteers. It will provide the smooth and secure management of volunteer information and recruitment, as well as provide a platform that volunteers can use to view and update their own hours and training. We cannot wait to get it up and running. New plaque

With the appointment of Canon Roxanne Eversley as Canon Librarian we needed a new plaque in the clergy stalls. This has been made by local carver Jim Patrick, paid for by the Friends.

Lancelot's Link clean

Integral to demonstrating a warm and uplifting welcome, the north entrance to the cathedral is being improved in appearance and arrangement. The thriving café and recent re-location and refurbishment of the cathedral

shop are a proven success. The focus now is to enhance Mandela Porch and the Link building which draw visitors into the cathedral.

In response to complaints about the Link floor and how dirty it had become, the cathedral with the generous help of the Friends has embarked on a cleaning project to improve the appearance of the existing building fabric and to expose again the qualities of the architecture.

The first stage of these works has been completed by a specialist floor cleaner. The stone had not been professionally cleaned and was showing the wear of almost 25 years of use. When this floor was laid in 1999 it wasn't sealed and this has made cleaning and upkeep difficult. In January the stone was washed and cleaned with a soft brush and the residual water removed using a dry vacuum. After a period of drying out the stone floor was sealed with a porous, vapour-permeable protective coating. A further period of two weeks is planned for conservation students to attend and complete the task including the engraving of the names of the parishes of the diocese.

Lent, Holy Week and Easter services at the cathedral

Study group: Passions of the Soul Sundays in Lent, 9.45am

This year we will be reading and exploring Rowan Williams' recent book Passions of the Soul. It is a short book. but it is rich with insight as to how the areat classics of Eastern Christianity can help us understand and cope with the ups and downs of modern life. The former Archbishop of Canterbury shows the cost of living in a culture that has a diminished and trivialized picture of the human self. He points to how the Eastern tradition teaches ways to develop our self-knowledge and awareness, so that we can relate to the world without selfish illusions. Only then can we be ready for our eyes to be opened to God, avoiding destructive patterns of behaviour, and become alert to the kind of people we need to become. Come and join us.

Mothering Sunday • 10 March

Join us as we mark the Fourth Sunday of Lent which is variously called 'refreshment', 'laetare', or 'Mothering' Sunday. It is a day away from the fasting and abstinence of Lent before Passiontide and Holy Week take us with Jesus to Jerusalem and to Calvary's cross.

On Mothering Sunday we follow our regular pattern of services and will be distributing beautiful posies at our 9am and 11am eucharists.

Holy Week

Holy Week address and compline Seeing in the Dark: Poetry and Holy Week

The Dean of Southwark, Mark Oakley, will take us through the days of Holy Week with the work of poets of different generations and cultures. He will explore the ambiguities, resonances, and provocations, of poems that seek to deepen the mystery of God rather than resolve it.

Palm Sunday • 24 March

On Palm Sunday we recall Jesus' journey into Jerusalem on a donkey. The crowd waved palm leaves and covered his path with them. We remember this with crosses made from palm leaves. Today also marks the beginning of Holy Week.

Maundy Thursday • 28 March

On Maundy Thursday we recall the Last Supper that Jesus shared with his disciples before his arrest and trial, and his commandment to them to love one another.

11am - Chrism eucharist Clergy and lay ministers from across the Diocese of Southwark gather for an act of commitment to ministry and the blessing of the holy oils for use throughout the year. 5.30pm - Evening prayer 6.30pm - Celebration of the Lord's Supper with Washing of Feet* (followed by the Watch of the Passion until 10pm) This service includes the washing of the feet of some of the congregation, recalling Jesus' actions prior to the Last Supper. Following the service there is a watch until 10pm reminiscent of Jesus' long agony in the Garden

of Gethsemane.

Good Friday is the day when we remember the crucifixion and death of Jesus Christ. Holy Saturday • 30 March

Holy Saturday is a day of preparation ahead of the joyful celebrations of Easter.

9am – Morning prayer with litany 4pm – Evening prayer 8pm – Easter Vigil with confirmations This first service of Easter begins in darkness and marks the end of the emptiness of Holy Saturday and leads into the celebration of Jesus' resurrection. Also at this service we celebrate the confirmation of candidates from across the diocese.

Easter Sunday •31 March

On Easter Sunday we celebrate Jesus' resurrection from the dead.

11am - Choral eucharist

3pm – Evening prayer

6pm - Compline*
