Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. You know that when you were pagans, you were enticed and led astray to idols that could not speak. Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says 'Let Jesus be cursed!' and no one can say 'Jesus is Lord' except by the Holy Spirit.

Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' Now standing there were six stone water-jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, 'Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward.' So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, 'Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.' Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

A steward greets those who come to this house and welcomes them in the name of the God who calls them. They do so with reverence and respect, knowing that the people they meet are God's children and that the one we serve is the Lord and servant of all.

The President addresses those to be admitted.

Will you fulfil your role with dignity and with reverence?

With the help of God, I will.

Will you seek to help others to worship God?

With the help of God, I will.

Will you commit yourself to this task and will you be diligent in carrying out your responsibilities? With the help of God, I will.

The President admits each candidate in turn, saying:

N, I admit you to the Guild of Stewards of this Cathedral Church, in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

When they have been admitted, the President prays:

Almighty God, who has given you the will to undertake all these things, give you also the strength to perform them; that he may complete that work which he has begun in you; through Jesus Christ our Lord.



MISSION ALLOCATION 2024

Each year we give 10% of planned giving and Sunday collections to charities. The total amount to give away this year is £24,334. 10 shares each amounting to £2,400 are given with a balance of £334.00 in reserve for an emergency.

Deptford Methodist Mission Disabled People's Contact

A local organisation reaching out to disabled and older people isolated and separated from families and original communities. Our minibuses weave between luxury developments of Greenwich, Woolwich and Surrey Quays to collect around 60 members who are often isolated from the community around them. We offer friendship, a healthy cooked meal, handicrafts, advice, entertainment and trips out to a pub, gardens, the sea side and general shopping. 40 volunteers delivering around 14,000 hours a year helping with the preparation and serving of meals, chatting, laundry, escorting and busy in our on-site Charity Shop, The Well.

Nunhead's Voice Limited

Founded to benefit residents of Nunhead through education and to provide facilities in the interests of social welfare for recreation with objective of improving quality of life, e.g.

- The lvy Club started from a Southwark Council grant to provide activities for older people (social, physical and mental wellbeing)
- Nunhead's Voice Free Community Program nature club and tot's track activities, local community centre, community cafe, community garden.

Lalgadh Leprosy Hospital, Nepal

Nepal Leprosy Trust is a Christian organisation that serves people affected by leprosy as well as others who are ill, needy, marginalised, disabled or poor. At the Lalgadh Leprosy Hospital and Services Centre (LLHSC) they strive to provide compassionate high quality, preventive, curative and rehabilitative health care and also work towards active community outreach and social support and training programmes.

It is good to welcome you to Southwark Cathedral. Set on the south bank of the River Thames, in one of the most vibrant and diverse communities in London, this building has been a constant witness in a place of change.

The first church was built on this site around the year 606. First a convent, then a monastery, it became in 1106 the Augustinian Priory of St Mary Overie ('over-theriver'). With Westminster Abbey and St Bartholomew the Great in Smithfield, it is one of the three remaining great monastic churches of London. At the Reformation, the Priory became a parish church, and it remains so for the people of Bankside. In 1905, as south London was rapidly expanding, the church was consecrated as the Cathedral for the new Diocese of Southwark.

The Cathedral has a momentous and significant history and has had links with many famous and influential characters including St Thomas Becket, Geoffrey Chaucer, William Shakespeare and Charles Dickens. It has also been a Cathedral for those who feel on the edges of faith or society, our welcome reaching out to all people in their beautiful God-given diversity.

Here, our Christian faith is captured in our vision to 'make space for love: with heart, mind, and soul'. Faith requires our hearts to stand up for social justice, upholding integrity and kindness, and supporting the vulnerable and oppressed. It challenges our thinking, inviting our minds to be enquiring, honest, and generous. Faith also seeks to deepen our inner lives, with the arts and creativity, by sharing in the life of our community, and by learning the arts of prayer and attention. In Jesus Christ we see the human face of God, and our faith in him is our joy and our life.

We really hope you enjoy being here with us today and that we will see you again very soon.

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
