CHORAL EVENSONG

Wherever you are from and however you have come to be here you are so very welcome. Our service lasts about forty minutes and is led by our Choir and clergy. This gives you the opportunity to listen to some beautifully sung choral music, to be still at the end of the day and to reflect in a place where others have brought their joys and concerns to God over many centuries.

CAN I JOIN THE CONGREGATION?

Yes, of course: if you would like to stay for the whole service, you are welcome to sit in the seats beyond the stalls where the Choir is singing, or if you have only a few minutes feel free to just sit in the nave and let the space and the music communicate something of God's beauty beyond all words.

DO I HAVE TO SAY OR DO ANYTHING?

There are places where the congregation is invited to stand and you may like to do this, but it is fine if you prefer to remain seated. You will be invited to join in with some spoken parts, printed in bold in this booklet, but you don't have to.

MAY I TAKE PHOTOGRAPHS?

Please don't take photographs so we can keep the atmosphere peaceful and the space safe. We often have children singing so you can't take pictures of the service or Choir rehearsal beforehand, though you are most welcome to take pictures after the service.

MAY I COME BACK TO ATTEND THIS SERVICE ON ANOTHER DAY?

Of course! Choral Evensong usually takes place in school term time on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays at 5.30pm, on some Saturdays and on Sunday at 3.00pm. Do check the Cathedral website just to be sure: sometimes we have to vary our usual routine.

WHAT'S THE AIM OF THE SERVICE?

Choral Evensong is an opportunity to worship God and experience God's loving welcome in a holy space that can feel like a window on heaven.

WHAT IS CHORAL EVENSONG?

Choral Evensong is a form of worship which is several hundred years old and is unique to the Anglican Church. To be at Choral Evensong is like dropping in on a conversation which is already in progress – a conversation between God and human beings which began long before we were born and will go on long after we are dead. So do not be surprised, or disturbed, if there are some things in the conversation which you do not understand at first. The text of the service is drawn almost entirely from the Bible. Its main purpose is to proclaim the wonderful works of God in history and in the life and death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. It also invites those who worship to respond with praise and penitence, prayer and obedience.

The service is in three parts.

The first part, which is very brief, prepares us for the story which is to follow.

The second part is the story of what God has done (and continues to do) to save his people, beginning in the Old Testament (the Psalm and the First Reading), then moving to the New Testament (the Magnificat, the Second Reading and the Nunc Dimittis) and reaching its climax as we affirm our faith in the words of the Apostles' Creed.

The third part is our human response to the God who has revealed himself in history, in Jesus Christ and in the Church.

WHY DOES THE CHOIR HAVE SO MUCH TO DO AND THE CONGREGATION SO LITTLE?

Whether it's your first language or not, music has a particular power, reaching out to express truths beyond words. In worship this can happen through the simplicity of a well-known hymn sung together, or as highly skilled musicians offer something more elaborate on behalf of everyone else. This is the pattern at Choral Evensong. The Choir and organist work in partnership with the building to point us towards the beauty of God that is our source and inspiration, and the congregation are freed to rest and rejoice in God's presence.

We are so glad that you are here and hope that you find the service enriching.

ABOUT BRIDGET

Bridget was born in Bristol and moved to London in 1997.

Prior to ordination, Bridget worked in full-time youth ministry in a range of settings, including churches, schools and running an emergency accommodation project for young people. Following ordination training at Trinity College, Bristol, she was ordained deacon in 2008 and served her curacy at Emmanuel Church in Croydon, before becoming Associate Vicar there. In 2014, Bridget was appointed as Vicar of The Good Shepherd with St Peter, Lee. She became Assistant Area Dean of Lewisham in 2017 and was made Area Dean in 2023. She served as Acting Archdeacon of Lewisham and Greenwich in 2024, prior to The Ven Dr Chigor Chike, who took up the role in September last year.



Bridget is married to Nick, who is a Reader in the Diocese of Southwark, and they have two adult children. She is very active, enjoying indoor climbing, running and yoga. She is a cold water swimmer and is currently completing her fourth winter swimming challenge. She expresses her creativity through dressmaking, DIY and decorating.

Bridget said: "Having lived in the Diocese of Southwark for 27 years, and having served in the Croydon and Woolwich areas over the past 16 years, it is a huge privilege to take on this new role," said Bridget. "I am thrilled to be joining the team in the Kingston Episcopal Area, and to getting to know the churches and communities in the Wandsworth Archdeaconry. For all of my adult life I've been involved in full time mission and evangelism, and remain passionate about proclaiming the gospel, and finding contextually appropriate ways to do that in our different settings. I hope to bring that passion to this role."



THE FIRST LESSON

Jeremiah 1.4-10

Read by The Rev'd Chris Henriette Curate, The Good Shepherd with St Peter, Lee

The First Lesson is written in the first chapter of the Book of the Prophet Jeremiah, beginning at the fourth verse.

The word of the Lord came to me saying,

'Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you; I appointed you a prophet to the nations.'

Then I said, 'Ah, Lord God! Truly I do not know how to speak, for I am only a boy.' But the Lord said to me,

'Do not say, "I am only a boy"; for you shall go to all to whom I send you, and you shall speak whatever I command you. Do not be afraid of them, for I am with you to deliver you, says the Lord.'

Then the Lord put out his hand and touched my mouth; and the Lord said to me,

'Now I have put my words in your mouth. See, today I appoint you over nations and over kingdoms, to pluck up and to pull down, to destroy and to overthrow, to build and to plant.'

Here ends the First Lesson.

THE COLLATION & INSTALLATION OF THE ARCHDEACON OF WANDSWORTH

The Bishop of Kingston, the Dean, the Residentiary Canons and the Archdeacons move to stand at the Tower Steps. The Archdeacon-designate stands before the Bishop of Southwark with the Bishop of Kingston. All others remain seated.

THE PRESENTATION

The Bishop of Kingston presents the new Archdeacon to the Bishop of Southwark saying:

Bishop Christopher, I present to you The Rev'd Bridget Shepherd to be collated and installed as Archdeacon of Wandsworth within the Diocese of Southwark.

THE COLLATION

The Bishop of Southwark reads the Deed of Collation and then says:

Receive this cure, your care and ours. Be diligent so to take your part with your brothers and sisters of the Chapter in the Government of this holy place, that here the word of God may be faithfully preached, and the sacraments duly administered: and in all things, so uphold the honour and dignity of our Cathedral and Collegiate Church that it may be a true Mother to the churches of our Bishopric.

The new Archdeacon then kneels before the Bishop of Southwark, who blesses her:

May almighty God, by whose grace alone we are accepted and called equip you for this ministry. And may the God of life, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, grant you the riches of his grace and strengthen you in his service this day and always.

All Amen.

THE INSTALLATION

The new Archdeacon stands. The Bishop of Southwark hands the mandate to the Dean and invites him to proceed with the Installation:

Mr Dean, I bid you proceed to the Installation of this our sister as Archdeacon of Wandsworth.

The Archdeacon of Southwark places the cope on the new Archdeacon. The Dean conducts the Archdeacon to her allotted stall. The Canons and Archdeacons follow, standing in the centre of the Quire, facing the Archdeacon as she is installed.

The Dean says:

By virtue of this instrument, I, Mark David Oakley, Dean of this Cathedral and Collegiate Church, do receive you and do admit and install you as Archdeacon of Wandsworth, together with all that belongs to the office and dignity to which you have been instituted; and do assign you your Stall in the Quire of our Cathedral Church, belonging to your Archdeaconry.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

All Amen.

The Archdeacon is given a Bible and a copy of the Constitution and Statutes of the Cathedral. The Archdeacon then stands and says:

Mr Dean, I, Bridget Claire Shepherd, Archdeacon of Wandsworth in the Diocese of Southwark, do promise that I will faithfully read and preach the word of God, administer the sacraments in due order and obey the Constitutions and Statutes of this Cathedral Church. And may the Lord be my helper. Amen.

The other Archdeacons and the Residentiary Canons say:

We welcome you into the fellowship of this Cathedral Church; we look forward to our future working together as partners in the Gospel.

The new Archdeacon, still standing, then invites the people to pray:

Let us pray.

Silence is kept.

O God, the King of Glory, who art ever adored by thy holy angels, yet delightest in the praises of the children of God: Prosper with thy blessing, we beseech thee, the work of our Cathedral Church; that they who minister or worship here may offer unto thee true and laudable service, for thy honour and glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

All Amen.

The members of the College greet the new Archdeacon as the congregation applauds. After the greeting, all return to their places. Please stand as the Choir sings:

THE MAGNIFICAT

My soul doth magnify the Lord : and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour.

For he hath regarded : the lowliness of his hand-maiden.

For behold, from henceforth : all generations shall call me blessed.

For he that is mighty hath magnified me : and holy is his Name.

And his mercy is on them that fear him : throughout all generations.

He hath shewed strength with his arm : he hath scattered the proud in the imagination of their hearts.

He hath put down the mighty from their seat : and hath exalted the humble and meek.

He hath filled the hungry with good things : and the rich he has sent empty away.

He remembering his mercy hath holpen his servant Israel : as he promised to our forefathers, Abraham and his seed for ever.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son : and to the Holy Ghost. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be : world without end. Amen.

THE SECOND LESSON

1 Corinthians 12.4-13

Read by Nick Shepherd, Licensed Lay Minister

The Second Lesson is written in the twelfth chapter of the First Letter of St Paul to the Corinthians, beginning at the fourth verse.

Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptised into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

Here ends the Second Lesson.

Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace : according to thy word.

To be a light to lighten the Gentiles : and to be the glory of thy people Israel.

It is good to welcome you to Southwark Cathedral. Set on the south bank of the River Thames, in one of the most vibrant and diverse communities in London, this building has been a constant witness in a place of change.

The first church was built on this site around the year 606. First a convent, then a monastery, it became in 1106 the Augustinian Priory of St Mary Overie ('over-theriver'). With Westminster Abbey and St Bartholomew the Great in Smithfield, it is one of the three remaining great monastic churches of London. At the Reformation, the Priory became a parish church, and it remains so for the people of Bankside. In 1905, as south London was rapidly expanding, the church was consecrated as the Cathedral for the new Diocese of Southwark.

The Cathedral has a momentous and significant history and has had links with many famous and influential characters including St Thomas Becket, Geoffrey Chaucer, William Shakespeare and Charles Dickens. It has also been a Cathedral for those who feel on the edges of faith or society, our welcome reaching out to all people in their beautiful God-given diversity.

Here, our Christian faith is captured in our vision to 'make space for love: with heart, mind, and soul'. Faith requires our hearts to stand up for social justice, upholding integrity and kindness, and supporting the vulnerable and oppressed. It challenges our thinking, inviting our minds to be enquiring, honest, and generous. Faith also seeks to deepen our inner lives, with the arts and creativity, by sharing in the life of our community, and by learning the arts of prayer and attention. In Jesus Christ we see the human face of God, and our faith in him is our joy and our life.

We really hope you enjoy being here with us today and that we will see you again very soon.

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
