THE GOSPEL

John 1.29-42

The Lord be with you

All and also with you.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

All Glory to you, O Lord.

The next day he saw Jesus coming towards him and declared, 'Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, "After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me." I myself did not know him; but I came baptizing with water for this reason, that he might be revealed to Israel.' And John testified, 'I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water said to me, "He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit." And I myself have seen and have testified that this is the Son of God.'

The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, 'Look, here is the Lamb of God!' The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, 'What are you looking for?' They said to him, 'Rabbi' (which translated means Teacher), 'where are you staying?' He said to them, 'Come and see.' They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon and said to him, 'We have found the Messiah' (which is translated Anointed). He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas' (which is translated Peter).

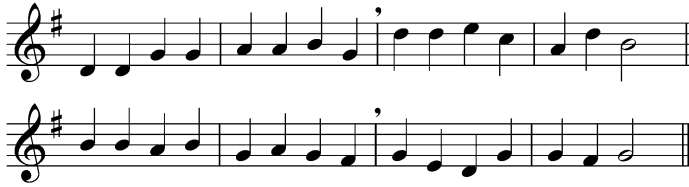

RESPONDING WELL CULTURE SURVEY

A big thank you to those of you who took the time to respond to the National Safeguarding Team's "Responding Well Culture Survey" in November. We received 36 responses from the congregation and 38 from the staff, - which gives us a helpful benchmark in terms of engagement, on which we need to build. We should receive the questionnaire which our INEQE auditors circulate in the next couple of weeks, and the strength of the cathedral community's responses will be a really important source of evidence for them.

Overall, responses to the Culture Survey were largely positive, though we can never be complacent. A couple of comments that emerged under particular headings deserve further conversation, so if you have particular concerns or questions emerging from the survey, and would value a conversation, Neil Morter, our Cathedral Safeguarding Officer, offers a safe space for any feedback that you might feel uncomfortable airing elsewhere. To summarise your responses: The majority of respondents agree/strongly agree that there is an encouragement of different perspectives and views and that the communication is respectful.

The majority of respondents disagree/strongly disagree that they would be taking a risk by expressing a different view and report that they do not have anxiety or fear about raising concerns.

The majority of respondents agree/strongly agree that we support each other through difficult times

The majority of respondents disagree/strongly disagree that there is an existence of coercive or controlling behaviour or that there is a command and control style of leadership (though several of you pointed out that you were unlikely to know whether poor behaviour is challenged, unless directly involved in such situations)

The majority of respondents agree/strongly agree that power is shared, leadership styles are inclusive, safe boundaries between people are understood and observed and that no one is left out.

The majority of respondents disagree/strongly disagree that powerful elites dominate life at the Cathedral.

The majority of respondents agree/strongly agree that people are aware of the impact they can have on others, feedback from others is welcomed, time is devoted to reflecting on behaviours, and leaders learn from failures.

The highest number of respondents agree/strongly agree that feedback to leaders has led to a change in leadership behaviour, but this is closely followed by those who are unsure. This again feels entirely reasonable, as changes in leadership behaviour as a result of feedback would only be noticeable to those who had provided that feedback.

Thank you once again to those who completed the survey. It's so important that we know how it feels for you to be part of the cathedral community, so that we can address anything that makes this in any way a difficult experience for you. Please do continue to help us to reflect on where we are now, and the best way forward.

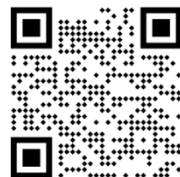
PILGRIMAGE TO WINCHESTER

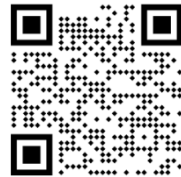

BEYOND THE THRESHOLD: A GLIMPSE INTO THE SACRED

A new exhibition by Sylvie Toutain has now been installed in the café.

'This ongoing photographic series I have worked on since 2012, it invites viewers to peer through church keyholes around the world as I travel. For the audience the revealing of the intricate and often overlooked details of these sacred spaces. At first glance, these images may seem like simple, abstract compositions, but upon closer inspection, they reveal a wealth of historical, cultural and symbolic meaning. The keyholes, often ornate and intricately designed, serve as a threshold between the public and private, the profane and sacred. They hint at the stories, rituals and secrets that lie within the church's walls, whilst also reflecting the artistic, architectural and cultural traditions of their respective countries. As reference in Rome with the St Peter's Basilica seen through the keyhole yet, these images also evoke a new era, in which churches are often locked and abandoned, their treasures and symbols of our cultural and spiritual heritage locked within, like forgotten tombs.'

RSPB BIG GARDEN BIRDWATCH

23-25 JANUARY

This is the largest garden wildlife survey encouraging everyone to take part in building a picture of how garden birds are faring. The RSPB has recorded that 38 million birds from UK skies have been lost in the last 60 years. It is free to take part in the survey and all you need to do is simply spend an hour counting the birds that you see from your garden, balcony or local park. It is good to welcome you to Southwark Cathedral. Set on the south bank of the River Thames, in one of the most vibrant and diverse communities in London, this building has been a constant witness in a place of change.

The first church was built on this site around the year 606. First a convent, then a monastery, it became in 1106 the Augustinian Priory of St Mary Overie ('over-the-river'). With Westminster Abbey and St Bartholomew the Great in Smithfield, it is one of the three remaining great monastic churches of London. At the Reformation, the Priory became a parish church, and it remains so for the people of Bankside. In 1905, as south London was rapidly expanding, the church was consecrated as the Cathedral for the new Diocese of Southwark.

The Cathedral has a momentous and significant history and has had links with many famous and influential characters including St Thomas Becket, Geoffrey Chaucer, William Shakespeare and Charles Dickens. It has also been a Cathedral for those who feel on the edges of faith or society, our welcome reaching out to all people in their beautiful God-given diversity.

Here, our Christian faith is captured in our vision to 'make space for love: with heart, mind, and soul'. Faith requires our hearts to stand up for social justice, upholding integrity and kindness, and supporting the vulnerable and oppressed. It challenges our thinking, inviting our minds to be enquiring, honest, and generous. Faith also seeks to deepen our inner lives, with the arts and creativity, by sharing in the life of our community, and by learning the arts of prayer and attention. In Jesus Christ we see the human face of God, and our faith in him is our joy and our life.

We really hope you enjoy being here with us today and that we will see you again very soon.

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
